In the 1840's Alexander Walker moved to Hillpark Enzie near Fochabers with his step-father Robert Ogg and his mother. Hillpark is about two miles east of the Braes of Enzie.


John Barclay was a gentleman farmer at the farm of Braes of Enzie, about half-way between the parish churches of Rathven and Bellie, Banffshire. The Braes of Enzie was a farm of 381 Acres, employing 4 Women and 1 boy as labourer. John Barclay was active socially in the locality. He was Captain in the Richmond Rifle Corps (5th Elginshire Rifle Volunteers). He acted as chairman at dinners after the cattle sales at Gordon Castle.

An entrepreneur, In 1846, Barclay purchased a 53 ft long whale, no doubt as an investment in Whale meat and oil:

Fochabers, Tuesday.—Last week a whale of the species Balæna physalus fin-fish, or finner, was captured by the Portgordon fishermen, and brought into the harbour. Its extreme length was 53 feet, and greatest circumference, that is, between the dorsal and pectoral fins 22 feet. It was sold by the captors to Mr Barclay farmer, Braes of Enziel for £23, a sum we should suppose, much beneath its value at any of the blubber ports, such as Peterhead or Aberdeen. It was being cut up, and sent to the former port. The species in question is much smaller than the Balæna mysticetus or great Greenland whale, and is distinguished from it by its dorsal fin, slender make, and inferior coating of blubber. They

Another of the farm workers at Braes of Enzie was Alexander Munro was born in 1822, therefore two years yonder than Alexander Walker.

## **Alexander Walker Connection**

Alexander lived less than two miles from the Braes of Enzie and would have known and possibly worked for John Barclay. He would also have known Alexander Munro who is also perhaps the subject of a tune.
